Just a few weeks ago, we all honored our Veterans on November 11. My thoughts were what a great time of the year to not only honor the brave men and women who have unconditionally protected our coun-

In our Region, in Eaton Rapids, near Lansing, setting on 472 acres, is the VFW National Children's home. The National Home has evolved to meet the changing needs of America's military and Veteran families.

The home offers that "hometown" community support with case managers who help residents set and accomplish major life goals as they transition from the military life to civilian life. These services and the housing is at no cost to the families as the homes are solely supported from private donors and organizations.

In 2006, the Steven Yokich Home was built. It was the first duplex and first ADA (American Disabilities Act) compliant house built on the complex and was sponsored by the UAW Veterans Affairs Department. Since then, the home's total maintenance and utilities are covered by the members, friends, and participants of the Region 1D Annual Golf Tournament at Black Lake.

So, when the complex needed a new truck to plow and maintain the 2 ½ miles of roads, they turned to the UAW and Region 1D for help. As always, the membership kicked into gear. UAW Local Union 598 leadership and membership took the lead and proudly built a plow truck for purchase by the Home. The local included it in their November dedication and recognition of the "Veteran of the Month," along with honoring all 2021 recipients at the plant. I say, that's quite a send off from our membership to the Children's

I would like to start this month's column with a thank you to all of those who participated in the national referendum vote. I do not yet have the results of the "One Member One Vote" question, but you should know that you have made your voices heard. As this is the season of giving, I also want to thank all the donors to our Toys for Tots campaign, which raised \$1,708. I have yet another thank you, to all who gave to the Old Newsboys, who provide vouchers for shoes, boots and socks for kids. We collected \$925 this year, which is even more than in 2020. We do only two organized collections like this each year, so it is greatly appreciated by our partner organizations. Both of which serve children in under-resourced communities.

Participation is key to a better union, whether it is raising up your voice for justice, or giving to those in need. Another important aspect of participation is EDUCATION.

An educated workforce builds a stronger union, just an educated citizenry builds a stronger society. As a member of a democracy, you must be informed about the issues and the candidates to ensure your vote and your actions support your values. It is the same with our workplace – being educated about the issues allows you to vote and act according to your own priorities. Using your vote, voice and actions to protect yourself and others is key to a strong Union where all people are valued.

Being your Union President as well as a member of the civil rights committee, I strongly encourage everyone to go to www.workplacebullying.org and

click on the tab, "Help for Bullied People". Go to the button that reads, "If Bullied, Start Here." That will bring you to a video called "Introduction to Workplace Bullying." It is not only educational, but a very interesting overview of this critical issue. The video is about an hour-and-a-half long. If this piques your interest, I would like to invite you to learn even more on this topic with me at the Union Hall. We will take a deep dive into this with the Workplace Bullying Institute from 11a-8p on Jan. 8, 9, 22 and 23, 2022 (via webinar). There will be a one-hour break each day, but we know that is quite a commitment of time, so we will be offering raffle prizes of gift cards and other surprises each day, as well as light refreshments. You are also welcome to bring your own food and drink. The sessions are free, but we ask that you RSVP by Jan. 3, 2022, by emailing me at UAW1753@gmail.com or just letting me know in person.

General membership meetings are key to being an active and informed Union participant. Please come to our next one on Jan. 19 at 2:15p. You may attend via Zoom (check Union info board for details) or in person at the Union Hall, as long as you are masked.

In the meantime, enjoy your holidays. Whether you celebrated Hanukkah or will be celebrating the Winter Solstice, Christmas, Kwanzaa, Boxing Day, the calendar New Year, Chinese New Year or even Festivus, remember to STAY SAFE when spending time with loved ones. The last "gift" you want to receive this year is a new variant of a contagious disease. Be smart about where you go, who you spend time with and how you protect yourself. If you participated in the GM-provided vaccines in the spring, you are now eligible for a booster shot. While it is very difficult to schedule an appointment through local pharmacies or doctors right now, the military is at Ingham County Health Department offering all three vaccines (Moderna, Pfizer and Johnson & Johnson) every Monday, Tuesday and Friday, from 9a-4p, with a one-hour break for lunch from 12-1 p.m. Anyone 5 or older is welcome, with no appointment or insurance needed. When I went after work on a recent Friday, there was no line and no wait! My wife had the same experience on a morning visit earlier in the week. The Omicron and other variants are no joke, and Michigan is still rated "Very High Risk" in the midst of our "indoor months", which means viruses can more easily incubate all around us.

When you immunize yourself against the virus, you make it less likely you will wind up sick, in the hospital or worse. Our Union Brothers and Sisters at Sparrow are locked in an extended battle with management over their contract and rights to humane working conditions, such as proper staffing, fair wages, manageable patient loads and working hours. Please consider and support them in their fight.

If you haven't finished your holiday shopping, remember to buy AMERICAN and look for the UN-ION label. Solidarity means supporting our Brothers and Sisters

across the country – and it also makes it more likely to get your purchases in time, since they won't be stuck on a container coming from overseas. This is also a good time to be supporting and sending encouragement to the organizers at the Amazon plant in Alabama, where the federal government just ruled in favor of a re-vote. Amazon has spent millions of the dollars you send them on union busting tactics so extreme that the Justice Department demanded a total redo of the vote to unionize. Please remember that before you send any of your hard-earned money to Amazon's CEO Jeff Bezos, who earns about \$3,715 per SECOND. He uses this wealth to oppress workers' rights, intimidate organizers and brainwash employees with lies about Unions. Amazon employees have zero job protections, no voice in their workplace, mandatory overtime at the will of managers and limited benefits. (Don't believe the hype in their commercials.) Grab your wallet and spend wisely!

Don't forget to look at your Union information boards each week in front of the cafeteria, west gate and rail dock gate.

Another year is coming to a close and more than 5,000 years since the earliest known New Year celebration, we humans will again promise to enter the new year with better conduct. Whether that's eating healthier, exercising more, paying off debt, praying more, drinking less, quitting smoking, reducing screen time, or improving relationships, it appears the New Year's resolution is here to stay. Regardless of your desire to participate, I am calling on all laborers to resolve to better understand our role in our union.

You'll notice that I used the word "our" regarding the union, because as cliché as it may sound, there is no union without U and I. It has become increasingly common to make statements about contracts, actions, and people related to the union that brands the institution as "the union". It's less common to hear or read the phrase "our union" or even "my union". I am of the firm belief that this terminology is subconsciously, or unfortunately even consciously, shifting the responsibilities of unionism from the members to some other entity that doesn't exist. Furthermore, I believe that this shift is exacerbated by the decline of social capital in this country, which is well described by Robert D. Putnam in the book, Bowling Alone: The Collapse and Revival of American Community. It is this shift from membership engagement and ownership, which along with other pressures, undermines the fundamentals of a labor union's existence.

So why choose this year as the year I task myself and my fellow members with the above resolution?

One needs only examine the unofficial results of the referendum process to see the clues of an inattentive membership. While the subjects of increasing voter turnout or member involvement are not unique to the labor movement, when such a significant change to the mechanics of the union only garners an estimated 15% of eligible members, a commitment to engage is obvious. Again, as a labor organization, we face a gamut of internal and external pressures on our ability to be successful. It would be foolish of me to believe that member engagement is our sole obstacle, but it is certainly one of the easiest to fix. A labor union, like our country's democracy, requires eternal vigilance. The UAW's core ideas, "the precepts of democracy require that workers through their union participate meaningfully in making decisions affecting their welfare and that of the communities in which they live" cannot survive from unions beginnings in 1935 through to the next century with little to no nurturing or involvement. So, as I wish all the Lansing Labor News' readers Happy Holidays, Merry Christmas, and a Happy New Year, I ask that our new year includes a reading of the UAW Constitutional Preamble and a commitment to reengage.



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
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
